**HORSES KILLED OR DISABLED 20**

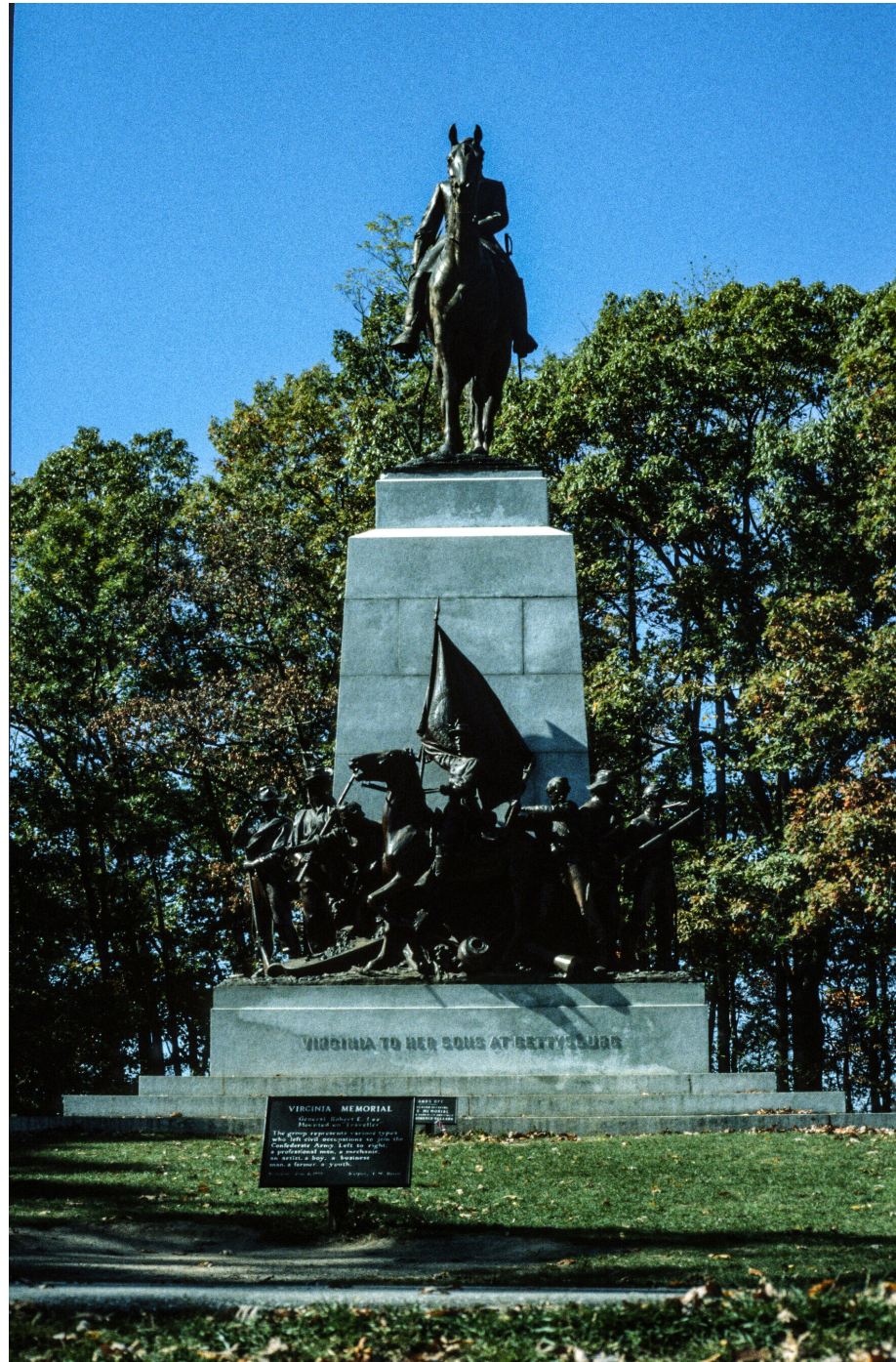












**VIRGINIA MEMORIAL**

Dedicated July 25, 1967. Reopened March 1998.
